### **GENERAL SESSION**: Called to order at 7:10 p.m. by Jesse C.

- A. Nomination for Member of the Month: Jesse Calleros has selected Jim Sonnenmeier for July...
- B. Jesse: RC-X: Thanks to all who helped. Also, Henry 4 won both first and second places in "Stick-and-Tissue" category.
- C. Use Permit Renewal request: July City Council meeting should handle it. June's meeting will deal with City budget matters. Note: Recently, a City Council member witnessed illegal flying, and was not treated well by the NON-LICENSED, NON-MEMBER fliers. We're hoping this doesn't jeopardize our plea for a five-year extension.
- D. Sunday, July 20, Glider Contest will be the sixth of the Southern California Soaring Club (SC2) summer competition series. HELPERS NEEDED. Landing judges and more. Contact Erv Szego, Contest Director: 714-235-9052; ervszego@msncom.
  - E. Mike Fox requested that we replace the winch lines. Jim S. says it's already been taken care of.
- F. Jesse: Jim Hanson printed off a set of labels for Jesse's planes, with Jesse's name, AMA number, and contact information. Jesse recommends that we all take advantage of Jim's good service. Low prices.
- G. Henry 3: We owe a continuing debt of gratitude to John Anderson and Ted Broberg for their work with young people's groups at schools, Teen Center, and GIRLS, Inc.
- H. Jesse: OCRCC's speaker last night was Lt.Col. Robert (Bob) Friend: former P-39 pilot. He also flew P-40's, P-51's, and others.
  - i. Jim Sonnenmeier: That club's field may be moving a short distance away, soon.
- J. Henry 3: OCMA has said they are willing to let us have a glider event any time we wish, given adequate notice. "There's some amazing lift out there."

### SPEAKER: Peter Kovari of the CRYSTAL SQUADRON, a full size sailplane club.

In 1966, he started flying airplanes. He has flown model sailplanes, and has flown Pattern planes. Norm Page, a recognized Pattern flier, told him he had started flying full-size gliders. It's very affordable. He bought a Libelle 201. Now, he has a DG 300. "We crew for each other, or hire a helper." Interested in helping? Henry 3 has the contact information. Your hotel expenses, etc., will be covered. "All you have to do is drive and use a radio." They fly at Crystal Airport, Llano, CA

He spoke of the hazards of landing "out": It's not advised. Land is not as smooth as it looks. Deserts and farm fields have lots of "surprises." Airports are preferred landing sites.

A tow runs about \$40-\$50.

He likes "straight-out" flights, "diamonds": 500 kilometers! He's done several diamonds. Altitude? He's been to 26,000 feet.

City staff issued a revised agenda time late in the afternoon of 20 May but the City Council decided to pull the HSS use agreement from the agenda in order to allow everyone time to review the latest version of it. We should be on the agenda for the next city council meeting scheduled for 3 June. This is the same day as our normal monthly meeting so some members will be at city bass instead of Round Table.

Towards the end of June, it turns out that the June city council meetings are taken up by budget issues. Robert Staples has told us the renewal will be on the agenda the first meeting in July.

### Member of the Month - Jim Sonnenmeier

Jim Sonnenmeier has been selected as our member of the month, and has provided the following background on his interests in model aircraft. Note that Jim holds a Doctorate in Mechanical/Aerospace Engineering. (Note that **PR** is Plane Rap.)

PR: How long have you been flying and how did you get started

**Jim S.** I started flying R/C 30 years ago when I started graduate school and could finally afford a radio. Prior to that I had built some free flight and a lot of plastic display models. I taught myself to fly during a long summer of trial and multiple errors with a Gentle Lady glider and a high start. Only after I could reliably get up and down in one piece did I find the local glider club which had access to a huge sod farm north of Buffalo, NY (The Clarence Sailplane Society).



**PR:** Do you prefer flying gliders over powered airplanes

**Jim S**. Generally speaking I prefer flying gliders though I do also enjoy powered flight. I really love the challenge of trying to stay up as long as possible by watching the plane and the sky, noting the wind, the birds and other signs of lift. It can be relaxing, exciting and frustrating all at the same time.

PR: How did you become aware of Harbor Soaring Society

**Jim S.** When I had the opportunity to move to California one of the very first things I did was look on the AMA website to find the local clubs. My second day in town I got a map and then found Fairview Park where I met Karl Hawley. He was sitting near the sign at the end of Canyon Dr and invited me to come fly that weekend. I had one model with with me when I came to town, the rest came later with the movers. So started my association with HSS.

PR: How many glider contest a year do you participate in

**Jim S**.I enjoy competition sailplanes and keep up with all the important contests locally, nationally and internationally. The SC2 contest series is one of the premiere contest circuits in the country. I try to get to 2 to 3 a year if possible.

### TASKS:

3 Rounds of Precision Duration – flights each worth 900 points – landing 100 points – 1000 total per round
Round 1: 5 Minutes, Rounds 2&3: 10 Minutes – For a total of 25 Minutes – Open flight order

2 Winches with retrievers, approximately 450' to turn rounds, landing zone behind winches on model runns


### **Photos of Your Planes**

## Fédération Aéronautique Internationale

Your editor is just one of many who get confused by the variety of international competition classes that have been established by the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale (FAI) Jim Sonnenmeier has kindly provided the following explanation. This information will also appear on our web site.



What are all these FXX designations?

A brief introduction to International Aeromodelling

### Fédération Aéronautique Internationale

Jim Sonnenmeier

The Fédération Aéronautique Internationale<sup>1</sup>, (FAI) is the world governing body for air sports for both full scale and model aircraft. Founded in 1905 in Lausanne, Switzerland it also governs and maintains records for all aeronautics and astronautics activities worldwide. Known as the World Air Sports Federation it, like all international sports federations, sets the rules and oversees the schedules for national and international competitions. Each country that participates in the FAI has a national aviation governing body as well. These are called National Aero Clubs or National Airsport Control Organizations. The National Aeronautic Association, (NAA) is the United States' representative to the FAI. The Academy of Model Aeronautics, (AMA) is an associate member of NAA.

International aeromodelling competition is the highest form of our sport. Like Formula 1 Auto Racing, FAI aeromodelling represents the best in technology, construction and performance. There is nothing like competition to push the limits of both pilot skills and the models. The quest for success fuels the imagination of modelers wishing to fly farther, longer, more precisely or more efficiently. Aeromodelling itself predates full scale aviation and has contributed to the development and advancement of the airplane from the very beginning until now.

World aeromodelling is overseen by a Commission within the FAI called the FAI Aeromodelling Commission, (CIAM) which stands for "Comité International d'Aéromodelisme". Other commissions within FAI oversee the specifics of other aviation activities such as racing, ballooning, UAV's, parachuting, aerobatics or full scale soaring for example. All aeromodelling activities are designated by their FAI class. The basic classes are listed below. F1 for example, covers all free flight models, F2 all control line models etc. Note that there are several radio control classes for the different types of models and activities. Each class has a Technical Sub – Committee within the FAI which is responsible for all rules and specifications within the class. Each country has a representative on the sub – committee to file rules change proposals, submit site bids for international competitions and world championships or comment on technological development trends. The sub – committees meet annually to discuss and vote on these proposals or other business within the class. AMA designates and advises these representatives with their FAI programs and team selection committees made up of representatives from each AMA district. AMA district.

Within the FAI classes are the various 'events' that are contested both nationally and internationally for the different types of models. These events are generally different than AMA events which are the subject of AMA contests. Rules and model specifications are often similar to or compatible with AMA rules but are, to the letter of the law, different. For example, F3J gliders are essentially the same as AMA Open class gliders in their function and use. Participation in a sanctioned FAI contest requires the purchase of an annual FAI Sporting License. Licenses are obtained through NAA via AMA headquarters. As in Olympic competition, from time to time, new FAI events are added. They are initially listed as provisional events to see if participation grows then they may be promoted to a regular event which can then possibly include a world championship. If an event has had low participation in recent history it can be eliminated. The current list of contested events (including provisional) is shown below for each class. World championship events listed are highlighted in yellow.

The rules and model specifications for the listed events are contained in Section 4 of the FAI Sporting Code.<sup>8</sup> World championships are held in alternate years with alternating lists of events around the world as described on the CIAM Sub Committee website.<sup>9</sup> Sometimes a World Championship may include several events at one contest. For example, the Free Flight World Championships cover events F1A/F1B/F1C for both Senior and Junior contestants (one exception is that Juniors fly the lower power F1P event rather than F1C) which could mean a team of up to 18 pilots!, three pilots for each event for both Seniors and Juniors. For other classes they will contest only one event. For example, the F3B Glider World Championships are held in alternate years to the F3J Glider World Championships. Each of these contests require a maximum of only 6 pilots, three each for Senior and Junior.

The AMA runs its FAI programs as discussed above primarily to select the teams to represent the United States at these world championships. Each team selection committee decides on a team selection program that may include participation in qualification contests or set minimum performance standards for pilots to meet before being allowed to try for the team at a final team selection contest. The selected team then has to raise funds to pay for attending the world championship contest, wherever it is held that year. AMA contributes some funding for the teams but it is far less than the total needed. Participation in FAI programs can be **very** time consuming and costly for equipment, practice, getting on the team and ultimately attending the contest. I encourage you to follow the FAI events in AMA's Model Aviation magazine or the hundreds of websites or facebook pages all around the world. Perhaps it will encourage you to participate in these programs. HSS Members have been involved in FAI events over the years. For example, Ross Thomas was previously involved with the F5B team and Dick Odle with the F3B team selection back in the 1980's and Chris Adamczyk's son Casey was on the US Junior F3J World Championship team in 2004 (2<sup>rd</sup> place) and 2006 (1<sup>st</sup> place and Casey was 3<sup>rd</sup> individually!).

### Be a Concerned Enthusiast – Support the AMA

As discussed in the April 2012 issue of Model Aviation (the AMA publication sent to all AMA members), the federal government has passed the FAA Modernization and Reform Act of 2012, which includes Sec. 336 Special Rule for Model Aircraft. This law prevents the FAA from passing any rule that controls model aircraft being flown under the AMA safety code. This Act resulted in part by the 90,000+ letters written by AMA members to their representatives.

The AMA will shortly be facing a new FAA regulation called the "small Unmanned Aircraft Systems" (sUAS) rule. In the next several months the FAA will post the preliminary regulation for public review. At this time the AMA will initiate a concerned citizens organization made up of AMA members to express their opinions of the preliminary regulation. To do this rapidly, the AMA will again contact all members by E-mail with instructions on comments and congressional contacts, which means the AMA needs everyone's current E-mail address. If you are not presently receiving occasional E-mail from the AMA, please go to <a href="www.modelaircraft.org">www.modelaircraft.org</a> and update your personal information. It is important for all of us to support the AMA especially in this endeavor.

### **2014 City Flying Permits Available Now**

A permit to fly radio-controlled model aircraft is required to operate model aircraft at Fairview Park. This permit can be obtained by going to <a href="www.costmesaca.gov">www.costmesaca.gov</a> and downloading the file Model Airplane Fly Permit 2013.pdf. You must also show proof of adequate liability insurance in the form of a current Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA) membership card or a current homeowners/personal liability policy specifically covering model aircraft operation with a minimum limit of \$500,000. Rules and regulations for flying the model aircraft can be found in the City of Costa Mesa Municipal Code, Title 12, Chapter II, Articles 2 & 3.

Permit Fee: \$25 per year. Learner's Permit for youths 6-14 years old - \$15 per year.

Recreation Division – Fly Permit City of Costa Mesa, P. O. Box 1200, Costa Mesa, CA 92628

Renewal Packet must include **ALL** of the following:

- Permit Application (filled out and signed).
- Copy of your drivers license.
- Copy of the AMA Membership Card (showing the required year) or homeowner's/personal liability insurance policy (specifically covering model airplane/aircraft flying with a minimum limit of \$500.000).
- Renewal Fee (\$25); payment by Check (payable to <u>City of Costa Mesa</u>) or charge to Credit Card (filled out and signed).

Note: Current permit holders with email addresses on file with the City will receive renewal packet information via email.

If you have questions or need additional information, please call the Recreation Division at (714) 754-5300.

Note that to fly at Fairview Park you need the above permit, liability insurance (preferably AMA), and you need to follow City of Costa Mesa Ordinance No. 07-01, City Regulations for Issuance, Suspension and Revocation of Permits to Fly at Fairview Park, Academy of Model Aeronautics Safety Code, and the Fairview Park Flying rules posted at the flying site.

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
